New administration for Bracknell Forest Council



The results of the local elections on Thursday, 4 May, saw Bracknell Forest Council move from a Conservative to Labour controlled local authority.

The results mean that the council now comprises 22 Labour councillors; 10 Conservative councillors; seven Liberal Democrat councillors and two Green councillors.

The change in political leadership brings with it a new council leader, Cllr Mary Temperton, a new decision-making executive and a new Mayor of Bracknell Forest, Cllr Naheed Ejaz. Since the elections, the new administration has carried out two executive committees where decisions have been made on:

- Investing £1.6m in Bracknell Leisure Centre to redevelop areas untouched during the 2018 upgrade (read more on page 17)
- Investing £350,000 in the special educational needs and disabilities (SEND) team to increase staffing, provide additional training and improve

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processes. They also agreed the new SEND strategy (read more on page 10)

- Accelerating and furthering the local hardship plan to help more families struggling with the cost-of-living (read more on page 16)
- Safeguarding car park users by agreeing to close the High Street car park later this year, following structural engineer advice that it is corroding. They agreed to add the site to the town centre masterplan for future regeneration (read more on page 18)

Additionally, a number of significant events and activities have been carried out, including:

- The borough's first Pride event, celebrating our LGBTQIA+ community
- A re-imagined Community Day to celebrate our diverse borough
- Armed Forces activities to give thanks to our local service personnel, their families and veterans
- Launching Craft Coop in Bracknell town centre to

provide a place for local artists and crafts people to sell their wares

- A climate change summit to work together with local businesses, schools and community groups and generate ideas for collective action against climate change
- Launching Solar Together so residents can afford to buy cleaner and greener energy

Work has also started to translate the Labour party's manifesto into an overarching Council Plan for the next four years. It will cover the themes of environment, community and the economy. Protecting our planet and reducing carbon emissions are hugely important, and action to address and monitor this will be one part of the Council Plan. Being out in the community, bringing the council to residents and making sure they are at the heart of every decision will also all be key parts of the new plan. The Council Plan is due to be adopted in the autumn and will be made available on the council's website.

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Leader's welcome

Following the local elections on 4 May, the council is now a Labour run authority. This is a change of council and a change of direction. We will prioritise provision for our youth throughout the borough, opening dropin centres to give young people an environment in which they can feel safe to talk confidentially.

We also want to try and get more community police visible on our streets.

Likewise, enabling more people to get on the housing ladder, whether that be through affordable renting, social housing, or part ownership, is a priority.

I want to make climate change a priority for all in the borough, not just the council, and so I have taken on the climate change portfolio of work to give it a real focus. We will work with businesses, faith groups and residents, meeting challenges and resolving issues.

I'm delighted that Craft Coop, a social business enterprise set-up to benefit and involve the local community, has recently opened in Princess Square. The giftshop and community space gives local artisans and craftspeople the opportunity to showcase and sell their wares within the town centre. I'd encourage you to visit when you are in town.

As leader, I plan to carry on working with my community and fellow councillors to make Bracknell Forest an even better place to live, work and visit. I look forward to meeting many more of you in the weeks and months to follow.

New mural brings subway to life



One of the most used subways in Bracknell Forest has been transformed from a dull, graffiti hotspot to a vibrant mural that celebrates biodiversity and pollinators.

The underpass under the Sainsbury's roundabout on the A322 Bagshot Road, previously had plain white walls, providing a blank canvas for graffiti. However, the new artwork, hand painted by artist Lynne Hollingsworth and her team, has breathed new life into the area, making it a more welcoming space for pedestrians and cyclists.

The mural has been designed to appeal to all ages and is dementia friendly with simple colours and bold shapes. Oak leaves, daffodils, daisies and bees can all be spotted, giving a nod to the beautiful green spaces across the borough.

Cllr Helen Purnell, executive member for environment and community cohesion, said:

"We are delighted with the results of the artwork in the underpass on the A322.

"We know this is a popular pedestrian route that has often been vandalised, so to protect this mural for years to come, it has been coated with anti-graffiti paint.

"Pedestrians can enjoy a glimpse of the Bracknell Forest countryside on their travels through the underpass, bringing a bit of green to a busy main road."

The mural is part of a wider council initiative to make foot and cycle paths across the borough feel safer. As part of the project, overhanging vegetation on the approach to underpasses across the borough has been cut back to let in more natural light and help them feel less enclosed.



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£350,000 investment in SEND team

The council's decision-making executive has agreed to invest £350,000 in the special educational needs and disabilities (SEND) team - to increase staffing, provide additional training and improve processes.

This follows on from the successful £1m bid for government funding to improve services for children and young people with SEND and a successful bid for funding to build a new autism spectrum disorder (ASD) school.

It also follows on from the latest progress meeting on SEND improvements with the Department for Education (DfE). In that meeting, the DfE recognised that the council continues to give this work high priority and progress is being made. It also acknowledged the detailed Written Statement of Action (WSOA) plan is being well managed.

At its meeting in June, the executive also agreed the new SEND Strategy for 2023 to 2025. The strategy has been co-produced with a wide range of people including early years, school and college leaders, professionals from education, health, SEND, third sector and care, as well as parents, carers, young people and children.



It was developed following a series of community events, online surveys, group discussions and one-to-one interviews. Tool kits that were created to engage parents, carers, children and young people were co-produced with the Parent Carer Forum (PCF). These tool kits were identified as good practice by the DfE in a monitoring visit and have since been shared with other authorities as an example of good practice.

Cllr Roy Bailey, executive member for children, young people and learning, said: "Improving services and opportunities for children and young people with SEND is a big priority. This additional funding will help secure extra staff in the council's SEND team as well as provide more training and improve processes.

"Progress is being made for children, young people and families with SEND, but we need this investment to make sure we have the additional staff capacity to keep making tangible improvements and that staff have access to training and development. We will continue to work towards providing excellent provision for SEND to ensure all children in the borough achieve the best possible outcomes."

Green volunteering scheme to boost wellbeing

A Bracknell Forest green volunteering scheme is looking for new recruits to join the expanding group.

- Orchard pruning at Lark's Hill in Warfield
- Footbridge construction at Big Wood in Binfield
- Composting wilted floral tributes at Easthampstead Park Crematorium

Volunteers have also included those referred by their GP or social prescribers. This is to take advantage of the health and wellbeing benefits associated with green volunteering. It makes people feel better, happier and more connected to other people and nature.

Frost Folly doubles in size!



An extension to Frost Folly opened this spring after its management responsibility passed to our parks and countryside rangers.

The new public open space lies to the south of Frost Folly in Warfield. Its addition doubles the size of the site to 24 hectares (59.3 acres).

The natural space contains wildflower meadows, ponds and broadleaved woodland. The maintenance is provided through funding released from the development.

Cllr Kandy Jefferies, executive member for culture, delivery and public protection, said: "We are delighted we can officially open this extension to Frost Folly public open space. It means residents can now enjoy access to even more natural

space."

Big strides to improve local rights of way

In 2022, we conducted a mid-term review of our Rights of Way Improvement Plan (RoWIP). This is our 10-year plan for improving footpaths, byways, bridleways, and restricted byways.

The purpose of the review was to assess progress made against actions over the past five years and to set priorities for the remainder of the plan.

Review findings revealed the physical accessibility of rights of way has been improved in at least 100 instances. Examples include:

- removed 35 step-over or squeeze stiles, which are obstacles to access
- carried out 29 major surface

What was already a well-maintained rights of way network is even more accessible now, thanks to the work of key stakeholders and the support of local volunteers.



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Providing you with reasonable adjustments



Bracknell Forest Council is committed to providing clear, reliable and accessible services.

We know that some people may find it difficult to access our services due to mental health, physical and/or hidden disabilities or literacy and language barriers.

Therefore, we are committed to making 'reasonable adjustments'. These ensure people with disabilities or long-term conditions can use our services as closely as possible to the standard offered to people without a disability or long-term condition.

What is a reasonable adjustment?

Under the Equality Act 2010 we have a duty to prevent discrimination and remove barriers to our services.

Every person is different, and their needs and requirements will be unique. Therefore, reasonable adjustments must be considered on a case-by-case basis.

For example, you may have a disability or condition that means you need information in large print or easy read. Likewise, you may need us to communicate with you by phone instead of email/letter or you may need someone (a trusted friend or relative) to attend a meeting with you.

We encourage people with a disability or long-term condition to tell us the best way to remove barriers for them so we can provide the best possible service.

How do I go about arranging a reasonable adjustment?

Our staff will do everything they can to meet your needs. The best way to arrange a reasonable adjustment is to call, write to or email us.

You can call our customer services team on 01344 352000, email them at: customer. services@bracknell-forest.gov.uk or write to customer services, Bracknell Forest Council, Time Square, Market Street, Bracknell, RG12 1JD.

Alternatively, if you are already in contact with someone about a specific service (including council tax payments, parking tickets, benefits) you can call, email or write to them directly using the contact details supplied and request a reasonable adjustment.

What reasonable adjustments do you offer?

Reasonable adjustments are a vital way of ensuring people with a disability or longterm condition can access our services as equitably as possible – they do not need to be complicated, complex or costly.

It may be that you need more time to reply to us or that you need someone to help you fill out a form. Alternatively, it might be that you need a sign language interpreter or access to a hearing loop when meeting with us. You might need someone to explain something over the phone rather than in a letter or vice versa.

You are the expert in what adjustment would help you, so we will always ask you what would work best.

We will always consider effective changes to help people with disabilities and long-term conditions and will implement changes that can be achieved in line with the resources available.

Be mental health aware

Our 'Let's Face It' free mental health awareness training course is back and people working in a customer facing role within the borough are encouraged to sign up.

The training aims to:

- help participants spot the signs and symptoms of common mental health issues at the early stages
- give participants the skills and confidence to have conversations around mental health issues
- provide information around local services for signposting and support
- support participants to have a greater understanding of their own mental health
- help tackle wider stigmatisation associated with mental health

Bracknell Leisure Centre to get £1.6m upgrade



The borough's main leisure centre will benefit from a £1.6m revamp to create an improved spa, new soft play area for children and additional fitness studio.

The final improvement plan for Bracknell Leisure Centre was agreed at a meeting of full council on Wednesday, 12 July, with work due to start later this summer.

The improvements will bring areas of the popular leisure centre up-todate which were not redeveloped in 2018.

It will see the space behind the café and the current squash courts transformed in to a new soft play centre for children, facing on to the existing café. New squash courts will be created in the space vacated by the Whoosh play centre.

The spa will be fully upgraded to a high spec and will be redecorated. All improvement work is due to be finished by early 2024.

High Street car park to close this autumn



High Street car park will close from the end of October as the structure has come to the end of its life.

While the car park currently remains safe to use, independent surveyors advised the council that it should be closed this year as the ageing structure is corroding. Structural engineers have stated the level of corrosion within the concrete reinforcement cannot be remedied.

The car park will remain open safely until the end of October. Work will then begin to secure the site and decommission it – which is due to be completed before the end of the year.

High Street car park is mainly used by council staff working in the nearby Time Square office and a handful of monthly season ticket holders. It is not the car park of choice for shoppers or those visiting The Lexicon.

Bracknell town centre has lots of alternative car parks available - Braccan Walk, Princess Square, Albert Road and Weather Way are all within walking distance of the town centre. The closure of High Street car park should not impact on people's ability to park, as only The Avenue car park reaches capacity at Christmas peak times, while others have plenty of space all year round.

Structural engineers have advised that the businesses under High Street car park could remain in place safely until 2025, subject to regular inspections.

Get moving in the sunshine as the council continues the free Summer Walks for Wellbeing programme, in partnership with sustainable travel experts, Sustrans.

Walking is great for the mind and body and one of the easiest ways to become healthier. Anyone can join and enjoy the benefits of being outdoors with 10 guided walks, led by qualified walk leaders, being offered across Bracknell Forest's beautiful countryside.

Walks will take place in various locations across the borough, including:

- Bracknell town centre The Elms and Lily Hill Park

as travel planning advice and route-finding assistance.

Cllr Megan Wright, executive member for adult services, health and housing, said:

"Our wellbeing walks have been extremely popular in the past and we are so pleased to have launched the summer programme.

"Walking is not only free, but it is one of the best ways to improve your activity levels. We are proud to say that anyone can take part, as all abilities are welcome and will be supported by our friendly walk leaders.

"Enjoy the outdoors and warmer weather, whilst learning more about active travel!"

There is no need to sign up for the walks, people can simply show up on the day in suitable clothing and footwear.

Co-ordinating roadworks

The council's highway team coordinates all work on the roads with a view to minimising traffic disruption as far as possible. This is achieved through the council's street works permit scheme, whereby any organisation wishing to work on the public highway must obtain a permit. During the year, there have been a number of ongoing roadworks across the borough which we understand can be frustrating for residents.

There are five main sectors with a statutory right to work on the roads, including: the highway authority, utilities and telecommunications. Following a directive from the Health and Safety Executive, the gas sector is currently nearing the end of a 30-year programme to replace all metallic gas mains within 30 metres of property.

There is also ongoing work by telecommunications companies placing fibre optic networks in the borough's roads. This is because the copper telephone and broadband network is reaching the end of its useful life and is being replaced with fibre optic cables capable of dealing with significantly more data. Telecommunications companies are given powers by government to install their equipment within the public highway and local authorities must not obstruct their work. However, companies must follow legislation regarding quality and safety.



Unfortunately, the council cannot force different companies to work together or inform us of their long-term plans. Currently we are dealing with an 82 per cent increase in workload compared with 2020/21.

We would like to thank the public for their patience as we continue to balance the competing demands from these companies.

£7.25 million being spent on the borough's highways

A number of roads, pavements and cycleways in the borough and set to be improved over the next year.

The council is set to spend around £7.25 million for ongoing maintenance that the local community has asked to see improved, including:

- filling in potholes
- resurfacing roads
- cycling improvements
- pedestrian routes improved
- highway maintenance

These improvements will ensure residents and visitors can travel safely and sustainably around the borough.

Work also includes several road safety schemes and improvements to tackle parking pressures and bottlenecks.

Planned traffic management and road safety work for 2023 to 2024 includes:

- a new pedestrian and cycle crossing on Temple Way (north of the junction with Boltons Lane), which will help parents and children get to King's Academy Binfield more safely
- a new zebra crossing on Cambridge Road in Sandhurst, near to Owlsmoor Primary School
- a new zebra crossing on Rectory Road, opposite Brakenhale School
- an extension to the upgrade of the footpath and cycleway on South Road to link in King's Academy Easthampstead Park
- increased parking areas in Claverdon, Swaledale, Kibble Green, Latimer, Fraser Road, Holland Pines and Prescott
- speed management schemes on Temple Way, Wood Lane, Park Lane and Sunninghill Road

More than £2.6 million will be spent on the planned resurfacing of a number of residential roads, as well as repairs to major roads such as the A322, A3095 and the A330.

There will also be £100,000 invested in technology to improve traffic flow and crossing points at key junctions. This will help improve journey times.

The £7.25 million is made up from £4.5 million capital budget (around 75 per cent from external funding, such as government grants and developer contributions) and £2.7 million revenue funding. The council has increased its capital funding for highways maintenance in 2023 to 2024 to rise to the ongoing maintenance challenges that all local authorities are experiencing.

Recycle right for Bracknell Forest

Recent statistics show that around a third of items thrown away in green bins could be recycled.

Therefore, residents across Bracknell Forest are being encouraged to think twice when separating their waste and recycling. Recent analysis into waste produced by Bracknell Forest residents has shown the following materials have been put in green bins as rubbish, when they could have been recycled:

- 10 per cent paper and card
- 10 per cent garden waste
- seven per cent films and wraps
- six per cent plastics (e.g. pots, tubs and trays)
- five per cent textiles
- five per cent glass
- two per cent tins and cans

Many of these materials can be recycled in kerbside collections or at local recycling sites such as bottle banks, reuse sites or the local re3 recycling centres.


