Buckler's Forest is a 42 hectare (103.7 acre) site containing rich history and wildlife.









Facilities

Wildlife and management

Buckler's Forest is home to many fantastic wildlife.

- Rare dragonflies and damselflies visit the ponds
- Dartford warbler and stonechat can be seen in amongst the heathland and scrub.
- Woodpeckers and hobbies nest in the woodlands.
- Common blue and grayling butterflies are attracted to the wildflower meadows.

Management helps to conserve and enhance the wildlife value of the site. We restrict access to some ponds to reduce disturbance and the potential introduction of invasive plants.

We're gradually replacing some of the conifers with wildlife-rich heathland and native broadleaved woodland.

Carrying out once per year meadow cuts helps wildflowers to thrive.

Did you know...? Please keep dogs under strict control from March to August, when rare woodlarks nest on the ground.
