

# The council's budget explained

# The council's budget is split into two:

- Revenue budget Covers dayto-day services, mainly funded by council tax, government grants, and business rates. Schools receive a separate government grant.
- Capital budget Funds assets like buildings and roads, financed through asset sales, government grants, developer contributions, and borrowing.



A household comparison: the revenue budget would cover gas, electricity, and food, while the capital budget would fund major investments like an extension or new driveway.

#### **Our 2025/26 budget**

This year's budget is £105.6m, plus £14.3m for capital projects, including:

- £2.7m for road repairs and improvements
- £445,000 for essential South Hill Park maintenance
- £500,000 for councilowned temporary accommodation
- £1.29m for new school places

#### **Council tax**

Over £85m of the revenue budget comes from council tax. A 4.99 per cent increase has been agreed to protect vital services, adding around £1.55 per week for an average Band D home (excluding town/parish costs).

Cllr Kathryn Neil, cabinet member for finance and business change, said: "We know it's never welcome news that council tax is increasing, but given the squeeze on our finances from years of government under funding and increasing service cost and demand, we have no real choice. If we don't increase council tax then we can't provide all the essential services our residents rely on like social care, bin collection, road maintenance, community safety, libraries, education and so much more. We know some people will struggle with this increase and so we are providing further council tax discounts to people in financial hardship."

#### How your council tax is spent

Council tax funds key services, including:

Social care (adults and children)

Registration services, and burial/cremation services

Libraries, leisure facilities, and family hubs

Bin collection, road repairs, and street cleaning

Housing and homelessness support

Climate change and biodiversity projects

Public health and safety services

Cultural activities

A portion of council tax also funds town/parish councils, the Police and Crime Commissioner for Thames Valley, and the Royal Berkshire Fire Authority.

# How council services impact your life

## Chloe, 27 - single mum to Emily, 3

As a single parent on a low income, I qualify for a council tax reduction, this helps me stretch my budget further to cover essentials like food and bills.

When I fell in to rent arrears last year, the housing team was able to provide expert advice and support

so Emily and I could carry on living in our home.

I get 30 hours a week free childcare administered by the council, which means I can work part-time without having to pay huge childminder fees. Emily's childminder regularly attends training by the council's early years team - this gives me extra reassurance.

When it rains, we'll head to the library or family hubs to take part in arts, craft or story time sessions. All these activities are free and provided by the council.

#### Patel family - Amit, 45, Priya, 43, Maya, 13 and Rohan, 7

As a family we use many council services without even thinking about it. For example, when our children started school, it was the council's school admissions team that made sure it was a smooth



process and we had all the information we needed.

Likewise, as Maya rides to school – it's the council that provides and maintains the good network of cycle lanes to ensure she gets there safely.

Recently, we've been on a health kick, and it was the council's smoke free services that helped Amit to quit smoking. As a family, we've been taking part in the council's walks for wellbeing to get our steps up and enjoy the wonderful scenery – so good for our mental and physical health.

Rohan also enjoys the local parks and playgrounds, and we've spent many happy weekends at The Look Out - having fun and learning at the same time.

We also enjoy all the family-friendly events in the town centre that the council provides for free – it helps keep the cost of entertaining the children down.

# James, 34 - single with a disability that impacts mobility

I live in an accessible home, which was adapted with help from the council's Disabled Facilities Grant (DFG). They helped fund my ramp, wider doorways, and a stairlift, making my home safer and easier to navigate.



Taking the bins out can be difficult, so I signed up for assisted bin collections. The council's team collects my waste and recycling directly from my doorstep, making this everyday task much more manageable.

Many of Bracknell Forest's parks, pathways, and public spaces are designed to be accessible. I often visit Lily Hill Park, where I can enjoy nature using wheelchair-friendly routes

The council's adult social care services provide carers and personal support for people with disabilities. They also run wellbeing programmes and disability support groups that help me stay connected with the community.

Thanks to these council services, I can live independently, stay active, and remain part of the community.

#### Margaret, 78 - retired

My older person's bus pass is a lifeline, and it was so easy to apply for through the council's website. I can travel for free on it to the shops, doctors and to see friends.



As I live alone, I get a reduction in my council tax, reducing the pressure of the cost of living.

I love reading and the library service has been great at providing me with large print and audio books. I've also joined a scrabble group and craft group at my local library for free, this has helped keep my mind active as well as make new friends.

I'm not as steady as I used to be and so I needed a few adaptations to my home like grabrails – the council's social care team sorted this out for me, so I can continue to live in my own home safely and independently.

# **Buckler's Park Community Hub**

Age Concern Bracknell Forest (ACBF) formally took over management of Buckler's Park Community Hub in December 2024, after completion of the lease.

# Understanding misinformation and disinformation

In today's world,
we are constantly
receiving news
and updates from
social media,
websites, and
news outlets.
While much of it is
reliable, some is false or
misleading.

Misinformation is false or inaccurate information shared without intending to deceive.

**Example -** A person shares a post on social media claiming a celebrity has died when they're still alive. The person sharing it might not know it's false.

Disinformation is false or misleading information deliberately created to mislead or manipulate.

**Example -** A group of people creates fake news about a public figure to damage their reputation or sway voters.

#### How to spot misinformation and disinformation

#### **Check the source:**

 Red flags: unknown sources, has a history of spreading false claims, or doesn't provide evidence.

#### Look for evidence

 Red flags: doesn't provide sources or uses vague statements like 'experts say' without evidence.

### Be careful of emotional headlines

 Red flags: overly dramatic or sensational headlines that feel too good (or bad) to be true.

#### Verify the date and context

 Red flags: posts or stories that have been shared without updates or context

### Cross-check with other sources

 Red flags: if only one website or social media account is reporting the information, it's worth looking into it more carefully.

### Beware of fake photos or videos

 Red flags: images that look altered or don't match the story, or videos that seem too polished or out of place.

What can you do to half

### stop misinformation and disinformation?

- Pause before sharing:

   think twice before sharing posts, especially those that are emotional or sensational. Always verify the information first.
- Report false content:

  if you see suspicious or
  harmful content, report
  it to the platform or the
  relevant authorities (for
  example, Thames Valley
  Police or local community
  safety teams).
- Educate others: share your knowledge with your children, other family members and friends, so more people are aware.
- Remember: social media platforms do not fact-check everything people post, so just because something appears on Facebook, X, Instagram, TikTok or other platforms, it doesn't make it true.

## **Improving Bracknell** Forest's roads

Millions of pounds have been ploughed into improving local roads, paths and bike lanes over the past year.



- Halifax Road and Ranelagh Drive.
- A new pedestrian island, bus stop and footpath improvements on the Maidenhead Road (near Jealott's Hill) to improve safety for people walking and using public transport.
- Creating parking spaces in: Beaumont Gardens (Harmans Water), Underwood (Great Hollands), Lindenhill Road (Priestwood), Yardley (Great Hollands), Abbotsbury (Great Hollands), Naseby (Hanworth), and Grantham Close (Owlsmoor).

More than £4m has been spent on resurfacing roads, including:

- The A329 Berkshire Way (between the Wokingham boundary and Jennett's Park roundabout).
- The A330 Maiden's Green (between Winkfield Street and Bracknell Road).
- The A3095 Mill Lane (between the Hanworth roundabout and Wildridings roundabout).
- The A322 Bagshot Road southbound (between the Coral Reef junction and Swinley junction).

A further £2.7m is earmarked for highways improvements in 2025/26.

# Building a stronger economy

# Bridging the gap between talent and opportunity

The Bracknell Forest Skills Hub launched in September 2024 and is a one-stop shop for training advice and support. Based at the Bracknell Forest Open Learning Centre, it helps residents build their skills and find new opportunities. It also works with local employers to support them to upskill existing staff and recruit trained staff.

Whether you're looking for a job, changing careers, returning to work, or upskilling in your current role, the hub provides guidance tailored to your needs. It brings together businesses, training providers, and education experts to help people succeed in a fast-changing job market.

Since the launch it has held over 50 career seeker consultations, engaged with 42 local businesses to discuss their requirements and training needs, and developed two bespoke training courses to meet the unique requirements of a local business.

### New affordable homes for local people





community and housing, said: "We have consistently said that we need more affordable properties in Bracknell Forest for local families. Likewise, we need more social rented properties so local people can access good quality homes at a lower rent.

"This is a big step forward and further demonstrates our commitment to creating safe and affordable places for people to live – a priority in the 2023 to 2027 Council Plan."



New affordable and social rent homes are being built in Bracknell Forest, providing safe, pleasant, and environmentally friendly housing for single people, couples, and families.

These include:

- A 100 per cent affordable development on Old Bracknell Lane, featuring flats and three- and four-bedroom homes.
- Affordable family-sized homes for social rent on Binfield Road
- 81 affordable homes on Market Street (29 shared ownership, 52 social rent).
- Energy-efficient homes at Coopers Hill, including 13 affordable two- and three-bedroom apartments.

# Next steps for town's redevelopment

Masterplans for three key areas in Bracknell town centre have been approved following public feedback and revisions. The masterplans include:

**Southern Gateway (bus station area and Jubilee Gardens)**Plans could include:

- New homes (apartments, townhouses, and older people's accommodation)
- Employment and office space
- · Community and youth facilities
- Shops, cafés, and play areas
- A new bus hub and public toilets

Bus travel will remain accessible with enhanced stops along Station Way, Station Road, and Market Street. Access to driver facilities, seating and bus shelters will still be available.

**Eastern Gateway (around Easthampstead Works)**Plans could include:

- New homes (including extra care housing)
- Employment and commercial space
- A new library and play areas
- Potentially a refurbished Easthampstead House

Plans could include:

- A range of new homes, including affordable housing
- · Commercial and community space
- Leisure, employment, trees, gardens, and new play equipment

Funding for the holiday activities and food (HAF) programme in 2025/26 has been agreed by the Government.

Eligible children in Bracknell Forest will be able to take part in the amazing activities during the holidays.

As with previous years, the programme will be open to children who are eligible for free school meals.

We're working with our holiday club providers to offer a range of activities that cater to children's hobbies and interests, including:

 Sports: football, basketball, tennis, golf and dance to keep children active and engaged.

- Arts and crafts: painting, drawing, and crafting sessions to inspire creativity and self-expression.
- Performing arts: drama, music and theatre to build confidence and showcase talents.

Additionally, we aim to run special educational needs (SEN) provisions so all children, regardless of their needs, can participate.

All participating children will also receive a healthy meal.

# Childcare hours are changing



Balancing work and childcare can be challenging, but new support for working parents can help ease family life while giving children a strong start.

Childcare support is expanding to include children from nine months old. Parents of children aged nine months to three years may be eligible for 15 hours of free childcare per week (38 weeks a year), increasing to 30 hours from September 2025.

Check your eligibility and apply at: childcarechoices.gov.uk.

Some parents receiving additional support or with a child on an education, health and care (EHC) plan can access 15 hours of targeted funding for their two-year-old. All three- and four-year-olds remain eligible for 15 hours per week, with working parents potentially entitled to up to 30 hours

# Making homes warmer and more energy efficient



"When I first heard about the home upgrade grant scheme delivered by Bracknell Forest Council, I was sceptical. The idea of free, government-funded home improvements sounded too good to be true. After discussing it with my family and researching the programme, I realised it was a great opportunity to transform my living situation.

"Before the scheme, my house was far from comfortable during winter. I relied solely on electric panel heaters, which did little to ward off the chill and were expensive to run. Even my hobbies, like puzzling and cross-stitching, became nearly impossible to enjoy. To relax I had to bundle in a blanket, trying to keep warm.

"Once I applied, the transformation began swiftly. The scheme installed an air source heat pump with radiators, solar panels with battery storage, and modern heating controls. The entire process took just a week, with minimal disruption. The tradespeople were courteous, professional, and ensured everything was tailored to my home's layout.

"Now, my home is warm and comfortable. My energy bills have been halved compared to last winter. I can finally enjoy my puzzles and cross-stitching in a cosy space. I am deeply grateful for the scheme and encourage any eligible resident to take advantage when these funded energy schemes are available."

# A fruitful endeavour!

A new community orchard is being established at Peacock Meadows in Jennett's Park.

Last winter, our parks and countryside rangers planted 16 fruit trees, two wild service trees and a native hedgerow.

As the fruit trees mature, residents will be able to enjoy spring blossom and autumn crops of apples, cherries, damsons and pears. Two of the apple varieties, Arthur Turner (cooking apple) and Fiesta (eating apple), are native to Berkshire.

The young native hedgerow surrounding the new orchard will be accompanied by a chestnut and rail fence, made by our rangers from locally sourced timber.

Traditional orchards are a priority habitat under the UK Biodiversity Action Plan (UK BAP), due to their importance for wildlife. Their mix of habitats, including fruit trees, grassland, hedges and deadwood provide food and shelter to wildlife.

The new community orchard is located near the car park off Swift Fields.

Cllr Guy Gillbe, cabinet member for planning, transport and countryside, said: "Thanks to everyone involved in this project, including the People's Trust for Endangered Species (PTES) for their funding contribution and advice.

"Creating at least three new community orchards is a target in our Bracknell Forest Biodiversity Action Plan (BAP), which runs from 2024 until 2029.

"A wide variety of species are associated with orchards, some of which have high conservation priority. We are hoping to attract pollinators, such as bees, butterflies and birds through these improvements.

"The new orchard will also give residents a quiet space to enjoy, with the opportunity to get close to nature."



# Helping you travel more sustainably

#### **Cycle festival**

The borough's first mini-cycle festival took place last September. The event, co-hosted by Trek Bracknell, Avanti Cycling, The Lexicon and Bracknell Forest Council, featured the Fusion Extreme display team, learn to ride sessions and a variety of stalls.

This year's event will take place on Sunday, 8 June in Bond Square - the same day as the Three Counties Cycle Ride.

#### **Bikeability**

Bikeability, the government sponsored cycle training programme for schools, is on course to be provided to over 1,100 school pupils this year. The training, delivered by Avanti Cycling, equips young riders with the skills to ride confidently in traffic. For more information, go to the Avanti Cycling website at avanticycling.co.uk

#### **Eco Rewards**

Eco Rewards offers rewards and incentives for schools, communities and businesses in Bracknell Forest to encourage more walking, cycling and public transport use. Over 150 QR code signs are placed around the borough, which can be scanned by a

smart phone to record green journeys and access scheme benefits. Earlier this year the scheme reached the milestone of 600,000 green miles reported. Wooden Hill Primary became the latest school to join the scheme, in part to try and reduce parent parking at drop-off and pick-up. For more details and to join go to: ecorewards.co.uk/bracknell.

#### Improving routes to schools

Following on from recent crossings built on the routes to Edgbarrow and Brakenhale schools over the past couple of years, more crossings are planned for this coming year. A new zebra crossing on Birch Hill Road has been installed.

#### Summer of fun

Council staff promoted walking, wheeling and cycling at the free Summer of Fun events last summer, as well as giving away some My Journey-branded goodies. Officers helped local residents plan journeys to schools and highlighted key walking and cycling links in the local area. # Recycling right in Bracknell Forest

#### **Recycling at home**

Our waste analysis found that 63 per cent of our green general waste bins could be recycled.





Food waste and textiles made up 25 per cent of the green bin waste. If you live in a house, all food waste, including coffee grounds and tea bags, can be recycled at the kerbside. Unwanted clothing and textiles can be recycled at local recycling sites, donated to charity or sold second-hand.



Paper and cardboard, plastic bottles, plastic trays, plastic pots and tubs, empty aerosols, cans, tins and foil and tetra pak cartons can all go in your blue recycling bin.



Garden waste can be recycled in your brown garden waste bin or garden waste sack.



#### **Local recycling sites**

Check before you go! You can generally recycle glass, textiles and shoes at local recycling sites. Find your nearest and check what they accept using: recyclenow.com/recycling-locator.

Don't leave any waste on the floor. If bins are full, please find an alternative recycling site or take it back home. Report any full containers using our online form: bracknell-forest.gov.uk/report-recycling-site.

If you do leave rubbish behind, you could be fined up to £400 for fly tipping.



# Easter collection changes

There will be changes to bin collections over the Easter period.

Good Friday collections will take place as normal. There will be no collections on Easter Monday, so all collections that week will take place one day later than usual, running up to and including Saturday.


