2027 Climate Action Scorecard Answers

This page provides information on specific questions in the [2027 Council Climate Action Scorecards](#) to assist markers with fairly assessing Bracknell Forest Council.

Buildings & Heating – Q5: Is the council part of a programme or partnership to support home retrofitting, through providing the skills and training needed or in other ways?

Under the Joint Climate Action Board that was launched in 2023, Bracknell Forest Council convened a Housing Working Group.

The following organisations were members of the Housing Working Group:

Chaired by a representative from Abri which is Bracknell Forest's largest housing association, the aim of the working group was to coordinate and support the retrofitting of domestic properties across the borough. In February 2026 the Joint Climate Action Board was relaunched. It is anticipated that new task and finish groups will continue these activities on a project-by-project basis.

Building & Heating – Q9. Does the council provide a service to support private homeowners to make their homes more energy efficient?

Bracknell Forest Council worked together with the Bracknell Forest Community Climate Action (BFCCA) to deliver the Bracknell Forest Community Climate Change Summits in 2025 and 2026. These events provided a council-supported opportunity that connected residents directly with local home energy efficiency installers, suppliers and advisors. Organisations including Instagroup, Heat Collector and Douglas Energy Solutions exhibited at the events, enabling residents to obtain advice on improving the energy efficiency of their homes and to engage with local providers of measures such as insulation, heating and renewable energy installations. Moreover, Warm, Safe, and Well was a scheme that ran between 2024 and 2026 delivering measures to reduce energy use in homes and improving the health of residents suffering from conditions made worse by the cold. The scheme linked local suppliers and installers with vulnerable residents, and fully funded a range of energy efficiency measures, including windows, loft insulation, cavity wall insulation, and more efficient heating systems. The services included a bespoke energy efficiency survey, an EPC survey for residents without an in-date EPC, free installation, and an updated EPC. On average, it was found to provide residents with an 11% improvement in EPC rating.

The Warmer Homes scheme is currently active and provides funding for residents with an EPC lower than a D and have a household income of below £36k. Residents again receive a bespoke assessment and energy saving measures installed free of charge.

Buildings & Heating – Q12: Has the council supported local community renewable energy infrastructure creation?

Bracknell Forest Council's solar installation scheme for organisations 2026 to 2027 is looking to support solar photovoltaic and battery storage installations on selected buildings using council or community funding. The scheme is open to charities and not-for-profit organisations; community and faith groups, including sports clubs; parish and town councils and businesses. Transport – Q1: Is the council transitioning their vehicle fleet to electric?

As of July 2026, 11 of the council's 21 vehicles were EVs, corresponding to 52% of the fleet. Note that this does not include vehicles owned by the council but used by contractors.

Governance & Finance – Q3a & 3b: Is the council reporting on its own greenhouse gas emissions? According to the council's own reporting, have the council's own greenhouse gas emissions reduced since 2019?

The council tracks its scope 1, 2 and 3 emissions (certain categories and suppliers only) emissions in line with the GHG Protocol on a calendar year basis. From 2019 to 2025, scope 1 and 2 emissions fell from 3,797 tCO₂e to 2,389 tCO₂e, a 37% reduction. Our emissions data is collected here and will be updated for 2025 shortly: [Bracknell Forest emissions data](#).

Governance & Finance – Q5: Has the council adopted a new governance or decision making process to put tackling the climate emergency at the heart of every council decision made?

We have introduced an Integrated Impact Assessment Screening Tool (IIAST), which includes a section on sustainability and cross-cutting themes. This includes questions on the key drivers of climate change (including housing energy use and transport), nature and biodiversity, and an overall assessment of the climate mitigation and adaptation impacts of the proposal or decision. We have embedded this in the organisation by offering training and guidance. It was used to assess budget proposals for the current financial year as well as a wide range of other proposals and decisions, and is being introduced for all relevant decision reports.

Governance & Finance – Q7: Does the council have a Cabinet member or Portfolio Holder that has climate change explicitly in their remit?

Biodiversity – Q1: Does the council use peat-free compost or soil in all landscaping and horticulture?

Bracknell Forest Council's Parks and Countryside team only use peat free compost in any landscaping and horticulture.

Biodiversity – Does the council have a target to increase tree cover and is a tree management plan agreed as they grow?

Bracknell Forest Council's [Biodiversity Action Plan](#) sets the following targets:

Woodland (pg 50-52)

- *Target 21: Enhance, restore or create 25ha woodland habitats, including ancient woodland sites where possible (Progress annually, achieve by 2029)*
- *Target 24: Create 3 new community orchards (1 in place by 2027 and a further 2 in place by 2029)*
- *Target 27: Identify 50 trees with potential to become veterans and improve management (progress annually, achieve by 2029)*
- *Target 28: Plant trees in an open, parkland style setting at 5 sites (Progress annually, achieve by 2029)*
- *Target 29: Include wild service trees in re-stocking and planting plans for sites in the north of the borough*

Urban:

- *Target 50: Plant or replace 50 large native urban trees, (Progress annually, achieve by 2029) (pg 59)*

The council is in the process of refreshing our Tree Strategy which will include a target for increasing canopy cover. Bracknell Forest Council has [the second highest tree cover in the country](#) (at 35.4%) and are working towards improving the condition of woodlands through invasives removal and a move from coniferous to broadleaved/mixed woodlands

Collaboration & Engagement – Q2a: Has the council published a climate action plan with SMART targets?

The [Bracknell Forest Climate Change Strategy 2025–2030](#) has SMART targets and is underpinned by [delivery plans](#) for its phases and [annual action plans](#). It recognises that, alongside reducing GHG emissions, adapting to the impacts of climate change is essential to protect residents, businesses infrastructure and ecosystems across the borough not just within the council. The strategy identifies local climate risks, including more frequent and severe extreme heat events, flooding, storms and wildfires and sets out a framework for delivery over the 2025–2030 period, including key objectives and priority actions. Adaptation is a core aim of the strategy.

Collaboration & Engagement – Q2b: Has the council published an up to date and easy-to-read annual report on their Climate Action Plan?

The council publishes an annual climate change report, which uses simple English where possible and uses graphics and tables to aid comprehension. It has also previously reported quarterly on progress made towards SMART targets. Under the new climate change strategy, this will be integrated into the main annual report going forward. Collaboration & Engagement – Q5a: Does the council have an ongoing way for residents to influence the implementation of the council's Climate Action Plan?

The council collaborates and supports Bracknell Forest Community Climate Action (BFCCA), which is a local resident-run charity focused on advancing climate action in the borough. In particular, the council works closely with BFCCA to deliver an annual [Bracknell Forest Community Climate Summit](#) to collaborate with the residents and organisations on local climate action. In 2024, the council supported the BFCCA in the organisation of [10 NESTA Strategy sessions](#) which provided over 100 residents with the opportunity to share their views and inform the Community Climate Emergency Strategy. The council also convenes the [Joint Climate Action Board](#), which is a strategic partnership of key local organisations, with the goal of developing and coordinating collaborative place-shaping climate action across Bracknell Forest. BFCCA are a member, representing the interests and views of local residents.

The council's Climate Change Strategy contains a dedicated objective, Aim 3: Engage and Empower Residents and Communities to Take Climate Action, which sets out the council's overarching framework for engaging residents, communities and stakeholders. The strategy includes commitments to raise awareness, encourage participation in climate action, support behaviour change, and work collaboratively with partners and local communities. The strategy also sets out monitoring arrangements including engagement metrics with communications and schemes, resident surveys and qualitative stakeholder feedback.

Collaboration & Engagement – Q5b: Does the council's ongoing engagement with residents include those most affected by climate change and climate action policy?

The council's Climate Change Strategy/ Climate Action Plan has undergone an impact assessment using the council's integrated impact assessment tool. See appendix 2 for the full report.

Collaboration & Engagement – Q6: Does the council provide funding for community climate action, for example through an environment fund or climate action fund?

The council ran a £15k Climate Action Grant programme in late 2025, open to community organisations, parish and town councils and schools. This funded nine varied projects across the borough.

Collaboration & Engagement – Q10: Is the council working in partnership with local businesses to encourage decarbonisation?

The council have a [dedicated webpage](#) to support local businesses to take climate action. Through the [Berkshire Growth Hub](#), the council has offered [free net zero](#)

[masterclasses](#) for business, and a [Low Carbon Workspaces grant](#). The council have also launched a [solar installation scheme for organisations](#), including businesses, and also held an event for business on [using your net zero plan for positive marketing](#).

Waste Reduction & Food – Q1b: Has the council reduced single use plastic at external events on council land, property or public spaces such as roads and parks?

Waste Reduction & Food – Q4a: Does the council have a sustainable food strategy?

The council have a whole systems approach to healthy weight work plan which includes a strategic action group dedicated to healthy and sustainable food environments across the borough. This group is co-chaired by the climate change team and improving the sustainability of food systems across the borough is a core purpose of the work plan. The plan goes beyond council-only activity over several years and includes retailers, supermarkets, caterers, schools, workplaces, care settings, planning and licensing levers, and community food environments. The full plan will be published soon.

Waste Reduction & Food – Q4b. Is the council part of a sustainable food partnership?

The council's whole systems approach to healthy weight work plan includes a strategic action group dedicated to healthy and sustainable food environments across the borough. This group is co-chaired by the climate change team and includes members from local housing organisations, community organisations, NHS trusts and PCNs.

The plan goes beyond council-only activity over several years and includes retailers, supermarkets, caterers, schools, workplaces, care settings, planning and licensing levers, and community food environments. The full plan will be published soon.

Planning & Land Use – Q10a. Has the council identified suitable areas for new solar energy, wind developments and district heat networks?

In addition to the map for wind energy, the council has also produced a map detailing where a district heat network can be built within the council's area.
